



10. **Be considerate of the feelings of others.**





Please clip and save for referral.

To remember

Certain materials are not yet recyclable...

Please don't recycle these materials at your building site:

- › Glossy magazines and newspaper inserts
- › "Junk" mail
- › Cardboard food boxes or beverage cartons
- › Telephone books
- › Windowpane, glass, drinking glasses or dishware
- › Plastics

Did you know that...

There is enough waste generated in the Twin Cities every 10 days to fill the St. Paul Civic Center Arena.

Each person in Minnesota generates 6.8 pounds of trash every day, both in and away from home. Half of that can be recycled.

One ton of recycled paper saves 96 gallons of gas.

One four-foot stack of recycled paper saves the cutting of one tree.

As a reminder, our guidelines are:

- GLASS** — rinse all food and beverage glass - place in proper container for each color
- CANS** — rinse all food and beverage cans - place in proper container
- NEWSPAPERS ONLY** — no other paper, no magazines, no plastic bags, no plastic handles on paper bags
- CARDBOARD** — flattened corrugated only


Margaret Smith entertained her neice and husband from California for 10 days.
